Welcome to ISTAT AirLink's Haiti earthquake response project. We are dedicated to alleviating widespread suffering caused by the 7.0 earthquake that occurred near Port-au-Prince on January, 12, 2010. Through this portal, transportation donors are able to view the requirements of NGOs responding to the disaster. They can respond by making an offer to transport freight or passengers. Alternatively, any transportation donor may offer capacity they have available to be reviewed by NGOs participating in the project. Although, at the time of the humanitarian disaster in Haiti, AirLink's system was still in development, we have been able to implement an 'in development' matching program that we believe to be effective. CARE is continuing to rush aid and emergency team members to Haiti following the 7.0 magnitude earthquake struck the impoverished country on Tuesday, January 12. CARE has launched an international appeal for funds for Haiti to immediately start emergency operations, but the full extent of this catastrophe still is not known. As in all disasters, the immediate needs include clean water, shelter, food and medical aid, as well as sanitation and other waste management solutions.

CARE has worked in Haiti since 1954, first providing relief to people affected by Hurricane Hazel. Development activities officially started in 1959. CARE operates through a central office in Petionville, and has a programmatic structure dividing the country in two regions -- one including the northwest and the Artibonite, and the other, Port-au-Prince and Grand-Anse.

The CARE portal has needs posted.

It should also be noted that the ALAN (American Logistic Aid Network) portal is actively engaged in the relief effort. They are subscribing to needs from other portals and working with their members on transportation to Haiti.

Red Cross workers are assisting the Florida Department of Children and Families with repatriation activities at airports throughout the state of Florida with most activity at Homestead, Miami International and Sanford-Orlando. Assistance includes food, water, blankets, hygiene supplies, mental health and health services.

Red Cross workers are also providing assistance to foreign nationals with food, clothing, shelter, mental health and health services.

Service is available 24/7 at sites with high activity. American Red Cross Services are available upon request 24/7 at airports across Florida.

Donations

At this time, what we need the most are financial contributions – whether by check, online or by phone. The Red Cross and other organizations leading the efforts in Haiti most need financial gifts in order to best serve the people affected. Things like clothes are not helpful right now because there is nowhere to store them, no one to sort them, and it would be difficult to transport the items to Haiti. One good way to turn clothes into cash is to have a garage sale and then donate the money to the relief efforts.

Non-United States Citizens

Publix customers may donate any amount by adding it to their grocery totals when checking out at Publix registers. Collected money will be channeled through the American Red Cross and designated specifically for the Haiti Relief & Development Fund.

As a result of the earthquake that hit Haiti on 12 January 2010, thousands of persons within Haiti and abroad have lost contact with their loved ones. The aim of the Family Links website is to accelerate the process of restoring contact between separated family members. It is managed by the ICRC, in cooperation with the tracing services of the Haitian Red Cross Society and of National Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies throughout the world.

At this stage, the website offers the possibility for persons in Haiti and abroad to register the names of relatives with whom they are striving to restore contact. It will progressively incorporate information offering responses to those queries.

United States Citizens

Catholic Charities of Florida, Inc

Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese is working on an advocacy plan to address the needs of Haitian children (orphans) at high risk. Under a provision in immigration law, the Secretary of DHS may grant what is known as "humanitarian parole" to individuals facing medical or humanitarian emergencies. They think the Haitian children (individually - since it has to be done on a case-by-case basis) would meet this criteria. They are lining up the resources to carry this out.

Christian Contractors Association, Inc

CCA had a small affiliate in Haiti where we have made several mission trips after Hurricane Mitch, but we have not heard anything from those team leaders at this time.

Working closely with a partnering ministry that is located in Haiti 13 miles from Port-au-Prince in a town called Croix de Bouquet. Living In Faith Ministries and Double Harvest Ministries have worked with CCA in the past as we have partnered with them with the use of our warehouse and acreage for staging other events here at our Brooksville warehouse. CCA is presently storing some of their equipment at our facilities. We have made close to 50,000 square feet of our facility along with 10 acres of land available to brother John Brigner of Living in Faith Ministries.

One of our team members from North Carolina was flown in to the Dominican on Thursday and was transported to Port-au-Prince through our local contacts. He is self contained/supported and plans to be on the ground for a minimum of 2 weeks. Richard will be reporting back to CCA to give us his recommendations of future involvement. He is now driving an ambulance at the Border Hospital transporting injured survivors as needed. He is requesting more doctors which we are now working on contacting doctors that we have worked with in the past on other missions as Double Harvest has only one Haitian doctor on site with over 400 patients is what I am told at this time. They have relocated children from their school/orphanage to make room for the injured and homeless.

One other interesting point that my own personal church supports an orphanage in Haiti called Love A Child and 2 weeks before the quake we had made a decision to bring an 11 year old boy from this orphanage to the Tampa area where a medical team has volunteered to provide an operation in dealing with his spina bifida and club feet issues. In yesterday's service, we got word that they did find this little boy and our church family will be bringing him to live here in Hernando County where church members will volunteer to house, feed and transport him to and from the hospital for an estimated 7-10 weeks during the procedure. This has been a touching of the heart issue for us to say the least and hope that we can help in some small way to show God's love in action.

Had a meeting at our CCA headquarters in Brooksville, Florida with 2 of our Haitian members from Atlanta. They have asked for prayer as they have yet to hear from two of their family members. These two brothers have offered to come along our side as translators, they speak English, Creole, French and Spanish.

We have also had a few of our members call in offering volunteer services of operating forklifts, loaders, and heavy equipment for debris clean up and road clearing. At this time, I have not made those connections on the ground.

The drinking water well at Double Harvest before the earthquake was capable of pumping 300 gallons per minute of fresh water. At this time, we are told it is not working and hopefully the casing is not damaged below the surface of the ground. We do have a contact on the ground who has experience in well drilling that is going to visit Double Harvest in an attempt to repair their well.

We have also been in discussion with a few groups about the possibility of reactivating CCA's water bottling plant. Some of you may know that CCA owns a water bottling plant within 80,000 square feet of our facility in Brooksville. It has 3 active lines capable of bottling half liter, liter, gallon, 3 gallon, and 5 gallon purified drinking water at a very fast production rate as most of the machines are automated. We have been able to help by God's grace in many ways with this plant in the past years, but unfortunately at this time, our inventory of raw materials, staff, and financial resources are not in the condition needed to operate the plant at full capacity. Of course we are more than willing to bottle water and coordinate the shipping immediately as God provides the resources. We have discussed the shipping procedures with our friends at Compassion Alliance in Ocala.

We've also been contacted by the O'Gara Group and will be meeting at CCA's facility to discuss logistics as a staging area of resources. Our site is favorable as we are close to Tampa and have access to rail, air and truck shipping. The Hernando County Airport which borders our property is capable of large cargo planes.

We are coordinating our effort at this time with John at Living In Faith as I feel strongly that we should utilize and support ministries and organizations that have already been established in Haiti for years and not try to reinvent the wheel by attempting to set up a new operation. I've offered our entire facility and all incoming calls of resources to help LIF and DH Ministries to the best of our ability. They are aware that we are working closely with Florida Sert ESF-15 and Volunteer Florida and they of course have offered to help all of us in the Florida VOAD as well to the best of their ability if needed.

We now have six people in country. Purchasing 20 ft containers to leave in country as safe warehouse, shipping 367,000 super food meals per container with water purification equipment and field kitchens. Medical supplies being sent from our medical warehouse in Harvey, La. Our large 75ft wide 236 ft long 4 deck boat is being serviced for deployment. Can house and support 100 volunteers. We are working with our international organization out of LA who is our central point of coordination on the Haiti effort. We have contacts in Haiti that we have been working with for the past year. At this time we have teams being formed all over the US to be deployed.

We are also forming a large Medical team of 70-80 Doctors to go over as well. They will be set up in our larger (100 X 20 ft) yellow tent as a field hospital. We are working with the Haitian Medical Assoc and the Caribbean Med Assoc on this.

We have many large yellow tents available to set up for other needs sizes 61X36 and 32X16. We are coordinating our own transportation to the island

Compassion Alliance 1-17-10

Sending 6 to 8 doctors over to Haiti, more staff will be departing over the next 2 or 3 days. Making arrangements to send a number of containers to Haiti. We have 25 containers of bottled water to send which adds up to about 500,000 bottles of water and also 40,000 pounds of canned vegetables.

Convoy of Hope 1-17-10

We have been in contact with our teams on the ground at **Mission of Hope** throughout the day and are working with them to coordinate loads. We have also been meeting with logistics and are reviewing further shipping options.

Today, our teams are looking for a location to set up one medical and resource point of distribution. These also include tentative plans to begin targeting 500 families with a weeks worth of rations per family member. The success of these sites will hinge upon the security of the area. We will bring you more news as it becomes available to us.

The load that was scheduled to arrive in Haiti today has been delayed. This load will contain a full load of food and 100 tents.

A second load, containing water, medicine and medical supplies will be arriving at 4am tomorrow (Sunday). Currently, we have scheduled 10 containers to be sent to Port-au-Prince between the 19th and 22nd of January.

5:00pm

- **Base of operations** is the **Mission of Hope** just outside of the city of Port au Prince
- **Inbound loads** will be at the airport at the **Mission Aviation Fellowship Hanger**
- **Distribution**-Teams went to multiple sites to do distribution.
- **Meals served- 100,000**, more distribution on Sunday.
- **Go Teams**-Another team will deploy Sunday Afternoon and will be in Port Au Prince Monday.
- **Water Purification**-We installed a **water purification** system at an orphanage serving 150 children. They only had enough to ration out a 1/2 cup a day--now they have all the clean water they need.
- **Medical clinic**- We are still working on establishment. Medical teams are serving as needed.
- **Partnership**- Partnering with numerous NVOAD organizations and churches.

The Eagles Wings Foundation (1-19-10)

Preparations to deploy 5 personnel to support with 1. Comm's 2. Mapping and Tracking 3. Local Volunteer Management & recruitment 4. Medical team's coordination 5. Government Liaison. Expecting deployment Wednesday into PAP with flight access granted today via Tinsdale.

Attended PAM Sheltering, Humanitarian, and Feeding clusters with a multitude of agencies at UN Log Base. Numerous overwhelming logistics issues. Networking established and cooperating NGO's increasing. Military step up increasing. Liaison for security with Canadian Military Colonel.

Continued preparations of Haitian MOU's for 20, two ton flat beds with 60 person security team, 10 POD managers, 10 POD crews (60 persons), 1 POD manager, & PTF A Team plus preparations for staging of a Logistics Base for mass care operations, incorporating Sat COMM team, warehouse, plus three more 2 ton trucks, separate security team, medical team, and self supporting management team. Cooperating with local NGO's and police plus private sector.

Civil unrest issue: State Dept. reported 3 (corrected from State's initial report of 30) US Nationals were injured following an incident with a mob like attack. Sketchy details but it appears to be in the same area as our Recon team had been the Ops period earlier. We briefed all 3 meetings prior to this incident occurring. Unknown what personnel were injured or any other details.

We attended the only Feeding Cluster and Humanitarian cluster meetings yesterday at UN Log center. They reported specific numbers of meals cooked and/or distributed as being around 78,000 the day before. Their goal was to up to 125,000 yesterday.

Mission Harvest America, Inc. will begin collecting food and medical supplies for relief efforts in Haiti Wednesday in response to the Earthquake which occurred earlier today. Florida Association of Food Banks

18 Jan. 2010. The following is an update from Dave Krepcho at Second Harvest of Central Florida (Orlando) as they provide food support to evacuees from Haiti (missionaries, US citizens who were in Haiti when earthquake hit and are now returning to the US.)

Friday evening, 1/15:

Dept. of Children & Families (DCF) contacted [Second Harvest of Central Florida, the Orlando Food Bank] and needed food for expected flights to OIA. They were working with information from the feds and the State that was changing hourly.

SHCF provided one truckload (24') of water, Gatorade, various snacks and citrus - midnight through the early hours of Saturday. Approximately 100 Haitian Americans were on the plane.

Saturday, 1/16:

DCF re-deployed to Sanford Intl. Airport (just outside and north of Orlando)

Constant flow of military transports with 180 - 250 people per flight. DCF is helping with the repatriation after they go through Customs.

The first food they eat on U.S. soil is [provided by staff/volunteers from SHCF, the Orlando Food Bank]. They are very grateful and very hungry.

On Saturday, SHCF supplied two additional truckloads of assorted snacks and beverages, baked goods and citrus.

SHCF is working very closely with DCF and Airport Operations. We are provided security escorts starting with bringing our truck onto the tarmac next to the military's C-17 transport planes. Escorted from there through various security check points to a section of the terminal closed for the DCF activity where people are processed and get a chance to relax.

WE ARE OUT OF INVENTORY on the types of foods needed. We will do a sort on Tuesday with volunteers to try to scavenge another load. Projections for future need are vague at best due to lack of clear information from any source. Doesn't seem like anyone knows for sure. This disaster is yet again, unique to others. I heard that 45,000 Haitian-Americans will come to the States. Then 100,000 - 200,000 "refugees". They will be granted temporary status and I have not heard where they will be placed. Food relief efforts for these folks will be another method than what is currently being done.

Sunday: we provided another truckload.

DCF is expecting at least ten more plane loads this coming week, perhaps more. [note: About 1 truckload covers 2 planeloads, depending on product.] DCF and airport security and operations are terrific partners. D. Krepcho had a good discussion with State Secretary Sheldon of DCF last night at the airport. They are so appreciative of what SCHF is doing and are there to support us.

Update from FAFB conference call 1/18/2010

FAFB members are asked to send "hand to mouth" types of food and drinks to help SHCF (Orlando) provide interim support to evacuees as they arrive at Sanford International. According to official reports, all repatriation activities are being directed through Sanford International Airport.

Harry Chapin Food Bank of Southwest Florida (Fort Myers) has committed to delivery of 22 pallets of assorted snacks (granola bars, oat bars, Propel water, etc.) on Tuesday 1/19/2010

Second Harvest of the Big Bend (Tallahassee) has committed to a partial truck load of similar items and is coordinating transportation for a combined load with Bay Area Food Bank (Milton).

Florida Baptist Disaster Relief

The Florida Baptist Convention can offer the following in regards to repatriation efforts for Haitian earthquake efforts.

Mass Food Preparation
Temporary Child care
Haitian Translators French or French Creole
Chaplains
Shower/Laundry trailers with staff to man them.

We have a facility in Hialeah that could be used in many ways. It is the old First Baptist Church of Hialeah. 72,000 sq ft of building (some is being used) 3 acres of paved parking. That would be our kitchen base of operations if we have to provide the site. Working with Samaritan's Purse to get 2 people on one of their charter flight Saturday. We still would like to keep any FEMA or Military transport options open if they become available.

Florida Conference United Methodists

The United Methodist Church and the Florida Conference in particular have a special relationship with the people of Haiti. There is a large Methodist presence in Haiti, including a United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) Office that has been in place since 2005, and regular work teams sent through United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM).

Three executives of the Board of Global Ministries were on the island on a mission-related trip when the earthquake hit. They have not been heard from since the earthquake. Please join all United Methodists in prayer that they are safe and will be heard from soon.

As much as we all want to "do something," it is very important that we wait and allow the relief teams to do their jobs without adding to the chaos by sending unsolicited donations or teams. We are in constant communication with UMCOR and UMVIM as they work with the government and other responding agencies to provide relief and determine what is needed. We will coordinate our response through UMCOR and UMVIM. For now you can:

Samaritan's Purse (added 1-17-10)

- A 13-member Samaritan's Purse disaster assistance response team (DART) has been mobilized. Team members, including Billy Graham Evangelistic Association chaplains, left Florida this afternoon and are expected to arrive in Haiti around 5 pm.
- The rest of our team is scheduled to depart Florida for Haiti at 9:00 tomorrow morning.
- We are partnering with a medical ministry out of Ecuador, who will be sending six doctors to join our Medical Advisor on the ground.

- A truck was loaded overnight at our N. Wilkesboro warehouse. This truck drove through the night to reach Florida and meet our team to fly these supplies into Haiti. The items loaded are 4,800 blankets, 160 rolls of plastic, 2,200 solar-powered flashlights, two water community water filters, 1,152 jerry cans, and 1,440 hygiene kits.
- Emergency supplies, including hundreds of rolls of plastic shelter materials, hygiene kits, and water purification kits, will be sent on a series of charter flights beginning tomorrow. These items had been warehoused in Florida to pre-position them for emergency response.
- We have had extensive contact with our partners on the ground. This is a long-term partner of ours, and we worked with them during last year's hurricane response. They were storing some of our plastic there, and they have already mobilized 60 volunteers to put together and distribute temporary shelter kits.

The Salvation Army - 1-19-10

- The Salvation Army National Headquarters (NHQ) / Salvation Army World Services Office (SAWSO) has established an Incident Command Post at NHQ for stateside operations. Haitian relief operations are now being coordinated through NHQ.
- A limited number of Southern Territorial Emergency Disaster Services (EDS) personnel remain deployed in Haiti. These individuals continue to work with the division to support relief operations. Personnel, including medical doctors from the East and Central territories are also being deployed, as well personnel from SAWSO, International Headquarters, and the Canada & Bermuda Territory
- The Florida Division continues to provide direct support to the Haitian relief effort, deploying a team to continue to support the transport and staging area in Fort Lauderdale. A larger staging area is being established in Miami, FL, at a 100,000-square-foot warehouse that will be used to transfer supplies to Haiti. FLA Divisional Headquarters is deploying EDS equipment to support that site.
- At the request of NHQ, Southern Territorial Headquarters has placed about a dozen individuals on stand-by for deployment to Haiti. However, a deployment date has not been set for these individuals. As of this morning, this is the only request for additional personnel pending.
- As of now, the Florida Division has not received a request to assist in the repatriation missions going on across the state. All Salvation Army Florida canteens are on standby ready to activate in support of a repatriation mission request.
- We are not accepting small in-kind donations at this time; instead we are encouraging donation drives for this incident. Transport into Haiti for goods remains very difficult. Large quantity / Corporate donations should be referred to judith_rowland@uss.salvationarmy.org.
- Donors can text the word "HAITI" to 52000 to donate \$10 to The Salvation Army's relief efforts via their phone bill. It is important for donors to confirm their donation with the word, "yes."

We have just sent one 3 man assessment team partnering with the US leader of Vision of Hope Ministry to Cap Haiten, a key partner for us in the response, where we have a significant base infrastructure and several churches. We will be assessing Cap as an initial point to bring teams in/out of as it was not impacted and we have good infrastructure/personnel there.

We have a second 3 man team and a partner who is connected with the orphanage Shepherd's House, heading to PAP. We are planning to assess the orphanage, meet with as many potential partners as we can find, meet with our churches and ministry partners in PAP and pray a lot for Divine Guidance. Our two assessment teams will join on Thursday.

We also have a 7 person medical team flying in on Wed to Cap to help in the hospital there, and also to connect with Cure International, and assess medical needs north of PAP in those fleeing the devastation. We are collecting donations and basic supplies.

We will be a few days of seeing where the Lord is leading us, but we will want to be working with local church partners, doing holistic outreach, engaged in long term recovery, and prayerfully seeking to see healthy churches multiplied and hurting people cared for in the name of Jesus.
